Day One: Beginning to write for a professional publication

Writing teams will:

- learn what professional, not scholarly, publications expect
- how to submit a manuscript
- the style of writing favored by professional publications
- how to organize your thinking/ writing for an article.



Day Two: Editing the first draft

Writing teams will:

- receive an edited copy of their first draft
- enjoy one-on-one time with Joan on next steps
- begin working on final manuscripts.



Writing teams will:

- receive an edited copy of their final draft
- receive additional individual assistance with Joan on next steps
- have the opportunity to "peer edit" another team's manuscript.



While this is a three-day course, in between each session, teams will meet to draft and revise their manuscripts. The time involved is about 10-12 hours outside the three-day workshop.

On the last day, all previous participants are invited to a luncheon following the workshop where all writers share and celebrate their experiences. This course is designed for educators who have done exemplary work in their districts and have a passion for sharing what they have learned with other educators, either in Oakland County or in other parts of the country.

Preparing for the workshop is easy; just think about what work you have done that you want to share with others. So far, Oakland writers have written about a technology conference for teachers, standards-based grading in a middle school, leadership skills of administrators, critical literacy, classroom demonstration/observations, and more.
